OCTOBER 27, 2021

The regular meeting of the Planning Board was held October 27, 2021. This meeting was at the Lincoln Town Hall, 100 Old River Road, Lincoln, Rhode Island.

Chairman Bostic called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The following members were present: Tom Tuytschaevers, Jeff Almond, Tom Salvatore, Ken Bostic, Mike Reilly, and Ned London. No member was absent.

Also in attendance were Town Planner Al Ranaldi and Town Engineer Leslie Quish and Town Solicitor Anthony DeSisto.

CONSENT AGENDA

Chairman Bostic reminded members that the Consent Agenda is normally voted on in total unless a member motions to remove an item. Motion was made by member Reilly and seconded by member Almond to accept the consent agenda as presented Motion was approved by all members.

Motion to move 5 a. to next on the agenda by member Reilly, second by member London. Motion approved by all members present.

5. Major Subdivision Review

Town Planner present the proposed project as per the Technical Review Committee report dated October 19, 2021 (attached). A guarantee bond amount of \$107,640 was calculated and includes item of work as per the attached worksheet. This bond would be a cash bond The TRC did not express any concerns. The applicant seeks a Planning board approved guarantee bond amount in order to proceed to Final Plan. Final Plan approval was delegated to the Administrative Officer at the June 10, 2020 Planning Board meeting.

Applicant Bouthillette: States the reason for requests a surety bond in rather that a cash bond.

Chairman Bostic: Ask for the details of the bond. Bond detailed for the Chairman. Chairman Bostic: Asks Town Engineer Leslie Quish to confirm that all the work has been conducted per the TRC report.

Town Engineer Leslie Quish: Describes in detail the work completed and the one condition needed to be completed and is comfortable.

Chairman Bostic: Generally, the Town would like a cash bond but is open to the surety bond with reputable company and that all the conditions as complied with and prevent any lapses.

Members continue discussion regarding the bond. Chairman Bostic asks the applicant if he is in agreement with the conditions and details the conditions. Applicant agrees.

Motion by member DelGrande to accept the surety bond of plus or minus \$21,000.00, second by member Almond. Motion approved by all members present.

Town Planner Ranaldi: Presents the proposed project as per the Technical Review Committee report dated October 19, 2021 (attached). Based on the Preliminary Plan submission and review, the TRC confirmed that the applicant successfully addressed the technical requirements of the subdivision regulations for a Preliminary Plan review stage. If approved and the Board see fit to grant Preliminary Plan approval and barring any unforeseen concerns presented at the Public Hearing, the Technical Review Committee recommends the conditions as listed in the TRC report of this approval.

Attorney Joelle Rocha: Attorney for the applicant gives a high level overview of the proposed project. As to the waiver the Attorney states it is fine.

Member Almond: Due to the potential of fire Member Almond states the importance of the renovations of these mills.

Technical Review Committee Report

Dear Honorable Members,

On Tuesday, November 09, 2021 at 3:00 PM, the Technical Review Committee met to review the agenda items for the November 17, 2021 meeting of the Planning Board. In attendance were Al Ranaldi, Peggy Weigner, Michael Gagnon, Leslie Quish, Jeffery Almond, Russell Hervieux, Michael Reilly, and Francine Jackson. Below are the Committee's recommendations.

Preliminary Plan Discussion /
Approval

This application is under the 2016 Subdivision Regulations and represents the redevelopment of several mill buildings, formerly comprised of the “Sayles Finishing Plant”, into a one hundred and twenty-six (126)-unit apartment complex with associated parking. A total of thirty-two (32) units or 25% of the total unit count will be designated and deed restricted as low and moderate-income units according to RI Housing standards. The complex is proposed to have ninety-eight (98) one (1)-bedroom apartments, twenty-two (22) two (2)-bedroom apartments and six (6) three (3)-bedroom apartments. Seven (7) units will be handicap accessible. There are twenty-five (25) one-bedroom affordable units, six (6) two-bedroom affordable units, and one (1) three-bedroom affordable unit.

The project was submitted as a Comprehensive Permit and has requested eight (8) waivers. Seven of the total eight waivers were discussed and approved at the Master Plan stage of review. The eighth waiver, generated by a design element contained within the final site design, was recently requested. The project is in front of the Planning Board at the Public Hearing - Preliminary Plan review stage. Due to the size and complexity of this project, this project was reviewed in sections.

On **June 15, 2021**, the project received a Certificate of Completeness. According to our Subdivision Regulations, the Planning Board shall, within one hundred and twenty (120) days of certification of completeness or within such further time as may be consented to and obtain a written waiver of the deadline from the applicant, approve the preliminary plan as submitted, approve with changes and/or conditions, or deny the applicant, according to the requirements of Section 8.

Originally, a decision on the preliminary plan review must be made by October 13, 2021. However, the applicant consented to a review deadline extension. A decision on the preliminary plan review must be made by **October 27, 2021**, or within such further time as may be consented and obtain a written waiver of the deadline from the applicant. This review approval has a **one (1) year approval-vesting period**.

Site Layout

This application represents the redevelopment of several red brick vacant mill properties primarily located along Walker Street and Moshassuck Road. Several mill buildings that are in significant states of disrepair will be demolished and parking and green space areas will be constructed in their place. The proposed apartment complex will consist of one hundred and twenty-six (126) units with associated parking. The approved Master Plan project contained 128 units. A total 25% of the total unit count will be designated and deed restricted as low and moderate-income units according to RI Housing standards. Seven (7) units will be handicap accessible.

In addition, the Applicant should be aware that mill redevelopment projects often encounter unforeseen conditions. The Applicant must be willing to work with the Town to remedy any unforeseen conditions if needed. As a condition of approval, the Technical Review Committee recommends that a note be placed on the preliminary plans and construction plans stating that the applicant shall notify the Town at the appropriate time during the site work phase of the project if they discover any unidentified public infrastructure and allow the Town to evaluate the functionality and condition of the infrastructure. The applicant will cooperate with the Town to determine if any remedies are needed at that time. The Town will be responsible for any improvements to the public infrastructure if needed.

Parking

Parking areas are proposed in several locations around the buildings slated for renovation. A total of 240 parking spaces are proposed. The Zoning Ordinance requires two parking spaces per housing unit. This requirement would total 252 parking spaces. The applicant requested and received a waiver of twelve (12) parking spaces at the Master Plan review stage.

The proposed apartment complex will have several access points into the buildings. Due to the size and complexity of the project, a detailed parking assignment plan was developed. Walkways located between the buildings will connect the designated parking spaces to each building's entrances.

The Technical Review Committee expressed concerns about the proposed 27 parking spaces that back onto Moshassuck Road. Currently, the Moshassuck Roadway is not visually or physically defined to motorists. This area looks and feels like a large unmitigated parking area. The committee expressed concerns on how the complex is going to be physically and visually separated from the public roadway and the private property.

The Town met with the project engineers on site to discuss possible solutions. Based on the existing site conditions and traffic pattern, the project engineers developed a design that slightly relocates and significantly defines the portion of Moshassuck Road that abuts the project. The design widens the entrance from Walker Avenue onto Moshassuck Road. The existing vegetation will be removed to improve vehicular sightlines. An administrative subdivision is needed to accomplish this proposed design. This subdivision was reviewed and approved as part of the improvements made to the 85 Industrial Circle mill complex. The owner's representative was contacted and is in the process of developing the plans for an administrative subdivision.

Zoning

The applicant is seeking a Comprehensive Permit. While the applicant had the ability to submit the application under the Mill Conversion Overlay District (MCOD), the applicant chose to

submit the project under a Comprehensive Permit. The Technical Review Committee wants the Planning Board to note that the project was designed to take into consideration all of the requirements of the MCOD. At the Master Plan review stage, the Zoning Official reviewed the project and concluded that it meets the spirit and intent of the Town of Lincoln Zoning Ordinance as a mill conversion project.

Under this Comprehensive Permit, the applicant requested and received seven (7) waivers. The seven (7) waivers are as follows:

1. A waiver to allow multi-family residential use;
2. A waiver from the parking requirement of two spaces per unit. The applicant is proposing 1.9 parking spaces per dwelling unit;
3. A waiver to exceed the impervious coverage maximum of 25% (this waiver is an existing non-conforming condition);
4. A waiver from Zoning Ordinance Sec 260-49(I)(6) which requires that the parking areas be screened from view of adjacent residential uses and public roads;
5. A waiver from Zoning Ordinance Sec. 260-31(B)(2) which requires that the parking spaces approach area be located off street (this waiver is requested for 27 parking spaces located along the southern face of Building 3;
6. A waiver from the 100 foot buffer from adjacent residential use is required;
7. A waiver of the Comprehensive Permit application fee of \$3000.00 (this waiver represents the town's subsidy of the affordable units as required by Rhode Island Housing).

Utilities

Public sewer and water are available to this property. Public sewer is available in Moshassuck Road. The Engineering Department conducted an investigation to determine the condition and capacity of the existing sewer main in Moshassuck Road. This investigation found that there is significant water infiltration in the sewer main. As a condition of approval, the developer will be required to line the sewer main in order to eliminate the existing water infiltration and increase the capacity of the sewer main. The applicant has agreed to this off-site improvement. The applicant received a Letter of Water Availability from the Lincoln Water Commission on September 10, 2021.

Wetlands/Stormwater Runoff

According to the submitted plan set, there are no known wetlands or watercourses within the subject property. An existing millpond is adjacent to project. A number of engineered systems will control Stormwater runoff from the site. The proposed stormwater management systems is made up of several Best Management Practices (BMPs). The Town Engineer conducted a detailed review of the submitted Stormwater Management Plan. All of her concerns have been addressed.

The Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management classified the complex as a redevelopment project. This classification has specific design and review guidelines. On July 15, 2021, Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management, Office of Water Resources, issued an Insignificant Alteration – Permit; Wetlands Application no. 20-0211 and a RIPDES permit No. RIR102112 for the proposed project.

Traffic

The Technical Review Committee expressed concerns about the future safety of vehicular and pedestrian circulation around the complex and on Walker Avenue and Moshassuck Road. The applicant conducted a full traffic study that included future pedestrian circulation within the complex and along the abutting roadways and an analysis of the nearby intersections. The Town Engineer reviewed the submitted study and had a few concerns that the project engineers has since addressed. All of the Town Engineer's concerns have been addressed. The overall conclusion of the traffic study found no major traffic concerns were identified in the traffic study.

The portion of the Moshassuck Road that abuts the project area will be leveled and overlaid with new pavement. Some roadway sections will be completely reconstructed based on onsite observations at the time of paving. This proposed off site improvement will require a Physical Alteration Permit from the Rhode Island Department of Transportation (RIDOT).

The condition of the existing sidewalk running along Walker Avenue was examined. The existing sidewalk consists of several type of pavement material that is in various conditions. To improve future pedestrian circulation within the complex and along the street, the applicant, as an off-site improvement, will remove and replace the existing sidewalk with a new five-foot wide asphalt sidewalk and a one-foot grass strip. The existing fencing running along Walker Street will be replaced with fencing similar in style and appearance to the existing wrought iron fence that was original to the mill complex.

The Technical Review Committee pointed out that the subdivision regulations call for concrete sidewalks. The applicant requested a waiver of this requirement and proposed the use of asphalt. The TRC discussed this waiver request. The Director of Public Works pointed out that Walker Street is a State owned roadway and that concrete is the standard pavement for all State installed sidewalks. Walker Street is scheduled to be rehabilitated according to the State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP - RhodeWorks). The TRC recommends that this waiver be denied based on the upcoming rehabilitation of Walker Street which includes sidewalks. The TRC expressed the benefits of having all of the sidewalk pavement be one consistent material.

Exterior Building Elevations

The Technical Review Committee reviewed the submitted exterior building elevations. The applicant is proposing to bring the buildings back to their original site configuration. Many building additions will be removed and most original window openings will be reconstructed. Areas of land against a building that were raised with soil will be dug out and the existing windows will be reinstalled. Landscaped courtyards will be developed between the buildings. The TRC reviewed the submission and did not express any concerns at this time.

Affordable Housing Distribution

A Comprehensive Permit application must show that the designated affordable units are integrated throughout the entire project. The applicant submitted floor plans showing the location of the affordable units in Buildings A, B, and C. Building D is a small two unit building that will not contain an affordable unit. The TRC reviewed the submission and did not express any concerns at this time.

Based on the Preliminary Plan submission and review, the Technical Review Committee confirmed that the applicant successfully addressed the technical requirements of the subdivision regulations for a Preliminary Plan review stage. If the Board sees fit to grant Preliminary Plan approval and barring any unforeseen concerns presented at the Public Hearing, the Technical Review Committee recommends the following conditions of this approval:

1. A total of thirty-two (32) units or 25% of the total unit count will be designated and deed restricted as low and moderate-income units according to RI Housing standards.
2. A note be placed on the preliminary plans and construction plans stating that the applicant shall notify the Town at the appropriate time during the site work phase of the project if they discover any unidentified public infrastructure and allow the Town to evaluate the functionality and condition of the infrastructure. The applicant will cooperate with the Town to determine if any remedies are needed at that time. The Town will be responsible for any improvements to the public infrastructure if needed.
3. An administrative subdivision is required to accomplish the proposed redesign of the Moshassuck Road which runs along the side of the project as shown on the submitted plan set.
4. The developer is required to line the sewer main in order to eliminate the existing water infiltration and increase the capacity of the sewer main.
5. The applicant will remove and replace the existing sidewalk running along Walker Street with a new five-foot wide concrete sidewalk and a one-foot grass strip as shown on the submitted plan set.
6. The portion of the Moshassuck Road that abuts the project will be reoriented, then leveled and overlaid with new pavement as shown on the submitted plan set. Some roadway sections will be completely reconstructed based on onsite observations at the time of paving.
7. The existing fencing running along Walker Street will be replaced with fencing similar in style and appearance to the existing wrought iron fence that was original to the mill complex as shown on the submitted plan set.
8. A Physical Alteration Permit from the Rhode Island Department of Transportation (RIDOT) is required for the proposed offsite improvements along the Moshassuck Road and Walker Street as shown on the submitted plan set.

Project Phasing Update

On June 24, 2020, the Planning Board approved with conditions the Preliminary Plan submission of this project. The approved project consists of 150 condominium units made up of 75 duplexes with one private access roadway off Old River Road and a second private access roadway off George Washington Highway. A total of 38 units will be designated as affordable according to RI Housing regulations.

The developer is before the Board to discuss in detail his approach to constructing the permanent underground infrastructure, some of which will overlap different phases. Enclosed is a brief summary of the proposed construction schedule.

Bond Review / Approval

This application is under the 2016 Subdivision Regulations and represents the subdivision of two vacant lots and a portion of an abutting lot under the same ownership into six residential lots. The total subdivision is 7.75 acres. Access to the new lots is proposed to be from a new cul-de-sac off of Great Road.

Construction was overseen by the Town Engineer (Leslie Quish) and the Public Works Director (Michael Gagnon). Multiple site inspections were conducted throughout the construction of this new subdivision. The applicant installed the majority of the public improvements according to the approved plans. Some elements of the project were purposely not installed in order to accommodate future home construction. The Town Engineer identified outstanding items of work and determined a bond amount to complete the public improvements at the appropriate time.

A guarantee bond amount of \$107,640 was calculated and includes the following outstanding items of work: bituminous surface course, detention basin items, streetlights, and granite bounds – See attached worksheet. This bond would be in the form of cash. The TRC reviewed the submitted bond information and did not express any concerns. The applicant seeks a Planning Board approved guarantee bond amount in order to proceed to Final Plan. Final Plan approval was delegated to the Administrative Officer during the June 10, 2020 Planning Board meeting.

Members of the Technical Review Committee reviewed the submitted plans and application seeking a Dimensional Variance for area lot relief for a four unit residential building located at 1612-1614 Lonsdale Ave, Lincoln, RI. 02865. The applicant is not proposing any new exterior construction. The Technical Review Committee recommends **Approval** of this application for Dimensional Variance for area lot relief. The Technical Review Committee feels that the application presents the least relief needed and is consistent with the surrounding neighborhood. The Technical Review Committee feels that granting the dimensional variances will not impair the intent or purpose of the Zoning Ordinance, nor the Comprehensive Plan.

PLEASE NOTE: According to Town Policy, the Town Of Lincoln will not provide garbage or recycling services to properties having four or more residential units. The applicant will be required to contract a private company for all garbage and recycling services.
